

Sallee deny counsel for the defendant...the reasonable time necessary for effective preparation, taking into account the exercise of due diligence." This justifies a finding that the ends of justice served by the continuance outweigh the best interest of the public and the Defendant in a speedy trial. Also, the Court previously declared this case complex for Speedy Trial Act purposes [R.19].

Counsel has discussed this motion with the Defendant, who agrees with her counsel's judgement that this request is justified. Likewise, counsel has discussed this request with an attorney for the government, who advised counsel that the United States would not object to this request.

On November 27, United States District Court Judge Claria Horn Boom, filed an order granting motion to continue trial. The motion reads this matter is before the Court on Defendant's Motion to Continue Trial [R.20], in which defense counsel indicates the Government does not object to the requested continuance. Having reviewed the Motion, and the Court being otherwise sufficiently advised,

It is hereby ordered as follows:

1. The Defendant's Motion to Continue the Jury Trial [R.20] is granted.
2. Trial. The Jury Trial currently set for December 11, 2018, is remanded from the Court's docket. The Jury Trial is rescheduled for Tuesday, February 12, 2019, at the hour of 9:30 am, before the Honorable Claria Horn Boom, United States District Judge, at the United States Courthouse in London, Kentucky. Counsel shall be present in the courtroom at 9:00 am.
3. Final Pretrial Conference. The pretrial conference currently set for December 4, 2018, is remanded from the Court's docket.
4. Pretrial

Filings. All pretrial filings and deadlines as set forth in the Court's Scheduling Order [R.14] shall be relative to this new trial date.

5. Motion for Re-arraignment. If the defendant intends to enter a plea of guilty, defense counsel shall file a motion for re-arraignment. All motions for re-arraignment shall be filed no later than fourteen (14) days before the scheduled trial date, absent good cause. A defendant is advised that failure to comply with this filing requirement will be considered by the Court in determining whether to grant credit for acceptance of responsibility. Following the filing of a motion for re-arraignment, and if the parties intend to proceed pursuant to a written plea agreement, the United States shall submit a copy of the proposed plea agreement for the Court's review at least three days prior to any hearing on the defendant's motion for re-arraignment. This document shall be transmitted as an electronic attachment to the judge's email.

6. Speedy Trial Act. The time between the current trial date of December 11, 2018 and the new trial date of February 12, 2019, is declared excludable in computing the time within which the trial must commence under the Speedy Trial Act. This case has previously been declared complex in the Court's Order [R.19]. For the reasons stated therein, the Court finds that the ends of justice served by the granting of such continuance outweigh the best interests of the public and defendants in a speedy trial. Specifically, for the reasons stated in the Court's previous Order, this case is so unusual or so complex that it is unreasonable to expect adequate preparation for pretrial proceedings or for the trial itself within the time limits established.

Sallee was indicted on May 24, 2018 (Indictment #6:18-CR-27-CHB) for allegedly

stealing over \$160,000 from the Jackson County government and misusing the identities of two other Jackson County employees to facilitate her thefts. The indictment stems from an investigation prompted by reports issued last year in which State auditor Mike Harmon's office identified several problems with Jackson County's finances and book-keeping that covered a period when Sallee was treasurer. The audits said Sallee wrote herself extra checks, including from a federally-funded program that helps counties prepare for emergencies. At the same time Sallee was allegedly padding her pay, she allegedly allowed county bills to go unpaid, costing taxpayer's extra money for late fees and interest according to the audits. Judge-Executive Shane Gabbard said at the time that the county had made changes to fix the problems.

The indictment alleges that Sallee misused her position to write several checks payable to herself without the approval of the Jackson County Fiscal Court. The indictment charges that the thefts took place between June 2012 and June 2016. Sallee allegedly deposited these checks into her own personal checking account or for cash. Over time, those unauthorized checks totaled approximately \$161,808.23.

To enable her scheme, Sallee allegedly forged the signatures of at least two other Jackson County employees on the checks, and later attempted to conceal her scheme by removing pages of Jackson County financial documents, obscuring page numbers with whiteout, and requesting the removal of check images from bank statements that were to be given to an auditor.

The investigation was conducted by the FBI and the Kentucky State Police. The case is being prosecuted by Trial Attorney Jessica C. Harvey of the Criminal Division's Public Integrity Section and Assistant U.S. Attorney Andrew T. Boone of the Eastern District of Kentucky. Sallee is being

represented by David S. Hoskins, Corbin, KY.
